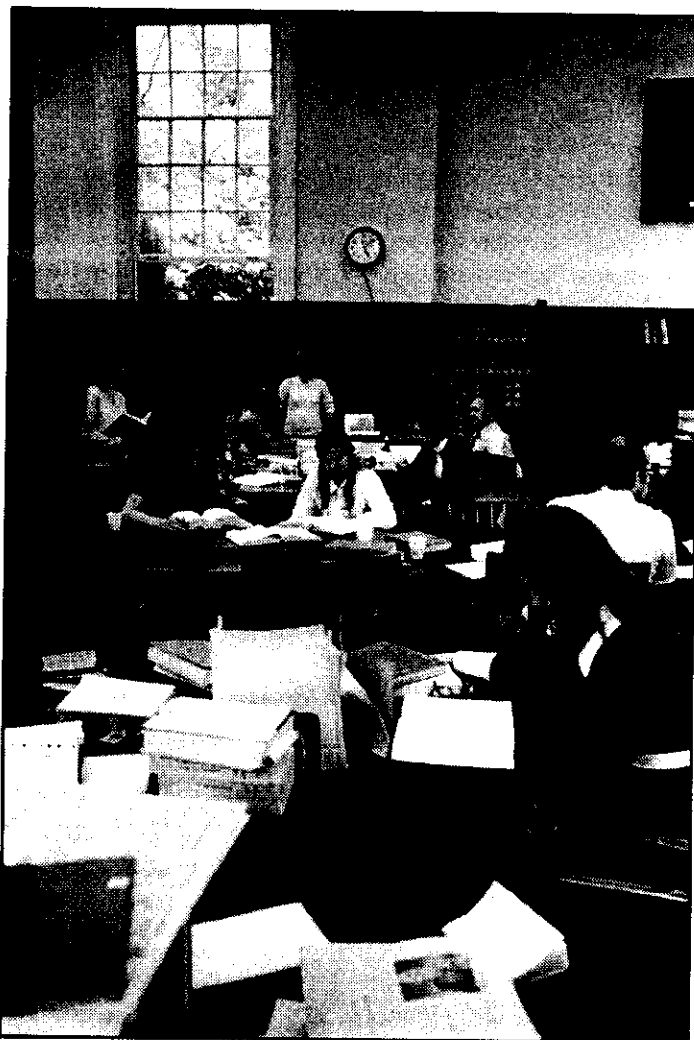

Law School Celebrates 25 Years of Women in the Classroom



The 25th anniversary of the first class of women at the Washington and Lee University School of Law will be celebrated Oct. 10 and 11 during weekend Homecoming activities at the university.

On Friday, Oct. 10, at 2:45 p.m., Sally Wiant '78L, a member of the law school's first coeducational class and currently law librarian and professor of law at Washington and Lee, will moderate a panel discussion on "Women in the Legal Profession." The discussion will take place in Classroom D of Lewis Hall. Panelists will include Lizanne Thomas '82L, Pam White '77, Wendy Giberti '99L, president of the Women Law Students Organization, and Jamiene S. Studley, deputy general counsel with the Department of Education.

Studley is a former member of the American Bar Association's Commission on Women and the Profession and she now chairs the editorial board of its quarterly publication, *Perspectives*. Studley graduated from Barnard College in 1972 and received her J.D. from Harvard Law School in 1975.

Seven women entered the Washington and Lee School of Law in 1972, and more than 800 women have attended since then.
